SPEAKING: Speaking Practice

PART I: Work with your partner. Take turns describing and comparing the items below. The goal is to use the most interesting adjectives possible!

TOPIC	SPEAKER A:	SPEAKER B:
1. Your Ideal Pet	Describe: What is your dream pet like? Example: "My dream pet is a fluffy, gigantic dog with calm eyes."	Respond: How is your partner's pet different from a common pet? Example: "Wow! That sounds like a gentle giant, unlike small, nervous chihuahua."
2. Favorite Food	Describe: Describe your favorite dish using senses. What does it look, smell, and taste like? Example: "I love spicy tacos! They have crunchy shells and a fragrant smell."	Respond: Ask about the ingredients or feeling. Example: "Do you enjoy the warm, satisfying feeling after eating such a delicious dish?"
3. A Famous Landmark	Describe: Describe a famous building or place you like. Use adjectives for size, age, or feeling. Example: "The Eiffel Tower is majestic, iron structure that looks beautiful at night."	Respond: Describe the experience of visiting. Example: "That sounds like an unforgettable trip. Were the crowds loud or surprisingly quiet ?"

SPEAKING: The Adjective Chain Debate

PART II: This activity is a great fluency drill. Your group (or class) will choose one topic. Each student must add a new, unique Adjective of Quality to the description without repeating any already used word.

Topic Chosen:

- My Weekend Was... (Choose an Opinion/Feeling Adjective: e.g., exciting, boring, relaxing)
- The New Teacher Is... (Choose a Personality/Appearance Adjective: e.g., patient, funny, tall)
- The City/Town We Live In Is... (Choose a Size/Condition Adjective: e.g., busy, small, colorful)

ADJECTIVE MYSTERY

PART III: Partner A secretly chooses a simple object (a pen, a shoe, a cloud). Partner B must ask five descriptive questions to guess the item. The questions must include an adjective of quality.

EXAMPLE DIALOGUE	ADJECTIVES USED
Partner B: "Is it <u>small</u> and <u>round</u> ?"	Small, round
Partner A: "No, it is not"	
Partner B: "Is it <u>heavy</u> and <u>metallic</u> ?"	Heavy, metallic.
Partner A: "Yes, it is"
